Dear Padre

January 21, 2024

While on vacation, I attended Mass at a church where many people left right after Communion. Why would they do this?

Canon law says the faithful are bound to participate in the Mass on Sundays and other holy days. We are expected to attend the entire Mass.

A misunderstanding of this law may be traced to a pre-Vatican II teaching. Some theologians taught that the Mass had three main parts: offertory, consecration, and Communion. Some people reasoned that their obligation would be fulfilled by attending only those parts of the Mass. They felt justified in coming late and leaving early.

This changed with the Second Vatican Council (1962–1965). The Mass is divided into four sections (introductory rites, Liturgy of the Word, Liturgy of the Eucharist, concluding rite), and Christ is present throughout the Mass. Attending Mass means being there from the processional hymn through the recessional hymn.

Some people have valid reasons for leaving Mass early, such as feeling ill or taking a crying child from church. Perhaps they are traveling and need to get to the airport on time. Still, I also wonder why there is a great exodus before the Mass has ended in some churches. In my opinion, people who are in the habit of leaving early should reconsider that practice.

Saints and Feasts of the Week

St. Marianne Cope – Feast Day is January 23rd. She was a German-born American religious sister who was a member of the Sisters of St. Francis of Syracuse, NY. She was a founding leader of St. Joseph's Hospital in Syracuse, which was one of the first 50 general hospitals in the US, and governed there for 7 years. She relocated to Hawaii in 1883 with 6 other sisters after consenting to a plea for help by King Kalakaua to care


for leprosy patients on Molokai. Spending many years ministering to them, she amazingly never contracted this disease. She's also known at St. Marianne of Molokai and is the patron saint of those suffering from leprosy and HIV/AIDS.

St. Francis de Sales - Feast Day is January 24th. He was a Catholic priest who later served as Bishop of Geneva & became a Doctor of the Church. Noted for his deep faith, he began dangerous work trying to reintroduce the Catholic religion during the Protestant Reformation with his intelligent and gentle approach. He had a great reputation as a writer, preacher, and debater in defending the Catholic faith. Along with St. Jane Frances de Chantal, he founded the Sisters of the Visitation of Holy Mary, known for its simplicity of its rule and traditions. He's the patron saint of Catholic writers, the Catholic press, the deaf, journalists, and adult education.





Conversion of St. Paul - Feast Day is January 25th. This feast commemorates the conversion of St. Paul to Christianity, which was a great event in the early church. As a Pharisee, Saul/Paul was persecuting Christians, but when the Lord appeared to him on the road to Damascus, this caused him to cease those persecutions and become a Disciple of Jesus. He then began a life of service to spread the saving Grace of God. His message to the world was that we're saved entirely by God and not by anything that we can do ourselves. This saving faith is a gift of being fully committed to Christ. He is known at the original Christian Missionary.
