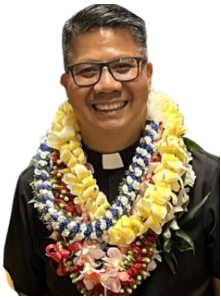

An Easter Message from Fr. Sieg:



“Alleluia, Alleluia, is our song, is our song. We are Easter people; we are Easter people. [Sing along, sing along”].

JOY is one of the messages of Easter and should be the one of the marks of a Christian. **JOY** is a sign of God. Is there **JOY** in your life? Do you radiate **JOY**? Are you a missionary of **JOY**?

So, Happy Easter! What Is Easter? Why do we usually have EGGS on Easter? Because Easter EGG means Easter is God’s Gift (of salvation).



Today we hear John’s account of the resurrection starting with Mary of Magdala coming to the tomb early in the morning (on the first day of the week, that is, today, Sunday). She saw the stone removed from the tomb. The Lord has risen! He has overcome death. It was victory of life over death, light over darkness, goodness over evil, joy over sorrow.

The resurrection is a beautiful story of hope, of new beginnings, of new life! The Mass becomes more meaningful because we relive Easter at every Mass. Easter Sunday could be the day of new beginnings. That is why every Sunday is considered a “little Easter,” where we at Church gather together to celebrate [take note celebrate] the life, death, and resurrection of our Lord Jesus at the Holy Mass.

As Christians & as Catholics, we are Easter people, we are Eucharistic people; that is, we give thanks. And an important sign of a living (alive), spiritual person, as *Reverend Stephen J. Rossetti aptly puts it*, is to be having a grateful heart. A beautiful and encouraging sign of a spiritually alive person is gratitude. Spirit-filled people are grateful people. On the other hand, when our hearts become narrow and bitter, it is a clear sign that our spirits are asphyxiating (meaning it is hard to breathe). And when we are spiritually alive, it means that we are living in **en theos or “possessed by God” or “in God.”** When God is in us, we mirror the Divine attributes. (We see the Risen Christ in others; in ourselves.) We become passionate, creative, enthusiastic people. We know how to laugh and enjoy; we also know how to grieve and sorrow. Rather than becoming sour and bitter, our hearts fill with gratitude. And we will know when we are spiritually asphyxiating or not spiritually alive, alert, awake, *en theos* (enthusiastic) & no longer “ran” like the apostles in today’s gospel when we have: 1) lack of enthusiasm; 2) absence of creativity; 3) lack of peace (inner peace); 4) lack of humor; and 5) lack of gratitude.

Happy Easter! Have you noticed how many times the word “ran” is being mentioned in today’s gospel? (I think 3 times.) When Mary of Magdala saw the stone removed from the tomb, she **ran** and went to Simon Peter & to the other disciple<...>; so Peter & the other disciple went out and came to the tomb; they both **ran**, but the other disciple **ran** faster. See “ran”; they’re alive, alert, awake, enthusiastic this Easter Morning! Are you ALIVE, AWAKE, ALERT, ENTHUSIASTIC [to mean *en theos or “possessed by God” or “in God”*] this Easter Morning?

“Alleluia, Alleluia, is our song, is our song. We are Easter people; we are Easter people. [Sing along, sing along”].

Where did the idea of an Easter bunny come from? What about the Easter egg?

The Easter bunny is really a hare which, according to an Egyptian legend, is a symbol of the moon. Easter falls on the first Sunday after the first full moon that occurs after the twenty-first day of March. Put this together, and we have an Easter bunny.

Early Christians gave new meaning to the Roman proverb *Omne vivum ex ovo*, which means, "All life comes from an egg." A hatching chick represented the risen Christ emerging from the shell of a tomb on Easter morning. Consequently, eggs were prohibited during the Lenten fast and were reintroduced at the Easter meal and also shared as decorated gifts. In 1610, a prayer by Pope Paul V blessed the egg "that it may become a wholesome sustenance to Thy faithful servants, eating in thankfulness to Thee, on account of the Resurrection of Our Lord." In some parts of the world, children carry baskets and torches and sing Easter carols as they go from place to place. They are given brightly colored eggs to put in their baskets. In other places, eggs are carried to church and blessed by the priests. The eggs are taken home and placed in the center of the table as the main dish at the Easter feast. Visitors to the house during Easter week are offered this sacred food of the resurrection. Happy Easter! ●
