FOCUS: We are called to be God’s temple, giving life to the world.

In baptism, we became temples where the Spirit of God came to dwell. THE BODY OF CHRIST ON PARADE FR. JOSEPH JUKNIALIS

Singing together during the distribution of holy Communion is one way of expressing the reality that we are one in the Eucharist, the Body of Christ. I once was taught to pray quietly during this time. If I’m honest, however, what I find myself doing after I return to my pew is watching others process past as they return from receiving Communion. They are a parade of holiness on the way. They are the longtime parishioners who have been making their way back to their pews in this way for decades—some now using walkers or canes, others with a bit of a slow hobble.

There are teenagers, too. Some, from the expressions on their faces, look like their parents made them come, while others look impressively prayerful. Young parents, too, caring for a new baby in their arms, and another couple holding a two-year-old’s hand as he tugs to escape and be free. And middle-aged single people, now halfway through this life’s journey. Young couples, as well, those just married or engaged and so obviously in love, but also widows and widowers longing for the love they once knew.

All of these are the body of Christ, the very temple of God built upon the foundation that is Christ Jesus, as Paul notes so well. This is why I watch them processing back to their pews. This, too, is prayer.

Should the pope get involved in American politics?

No, the pope should not get involved in the politics of any country. However, politics often intersects with religious concerns and particularly gospel values. When this occurs, the Holy Father has a responsibility to preach the gospel and defend the values the gospel teaches, even when it might sound political. He pronounces and teaches the values of the gospel, regardless of what nation or politician might feel confronted or challenged by what he teaches. What often happens is, when politicians find themselves in conflict with the gospel values the pope is teaching, they choose to say, "The pope has no business in our politics," instead of listening. Completely understandable, at least from one perspective, but probably also disingenuous from another perspective. Politicians are fully aware of what is being proclaimed and why it is being proclaimed but choose not to listen. That, too, is completely understandable, if regrettable. One has to think only of the scribes and the Pharisees, and more particularly the high priest, who said, "Consider that it is better for you that one man should die instead of the people, so that the whole nation may not perish" (John 11:50).

FEASTS AND SAINTS OF THE WEEK



St. Leo the Great – Feast Day is November 10th. This feast day commemorates Pope Leo I, who was head of the Church for 21 years during the 5th c. and was the first pope to be called "Great." He's known for saving Rome from destruction from the Huns by discouraging Attila from invading Rome through persuasion. He was also a powerful theologian and Doctor of the Church, who was revered for his writings, especially his "Tome to Flavian," which defined the dual nature of Christ. His pastoral leadership provided spiritual guidance and helped to maintain church unity during a turbulent period. He did significant administrative work and had the ability to lead well, manage the finances, and aid the poor. He's the patron saint of doctrinal teaching, pastoral leadership, public administrators, and threats to peace.



St. Martin of Tours – Feast Day is November 11th. Born in Hungary, this 4th c. saint, who was also known as "Martin the Merciful," ministered in Gaul (now France). After serving as a young soldier in the Roman army, he changed course and became "Christ's Soldier." His conversion happened when he encountered a poor, nearly naked beggar, who was shivering in the cold on a winter's day. Moved by compassion, he cut his military cloak in half and gave one part to the beggar. That night, he received a vision of Jesus wearing the half cloak given to the beggar. Since he was already learning about Christianity, he was baptized soon after and dedicated his life to God. He left the army and became a monk and later the Bishop of Tours. His feast day coincides with Veterans Day and many believe it was chosen in his honor, as he's the patron saint of soldiers. He's also the patron of France, the poor, and tailors.



St. Frances Xavier Cabrini – Feast Day is November 13th. Named Maria Francesca Cabrini at birth, this 19th & 20th c. Italian nun became the first naturalized U.S. citizen to be canonized a saint. Her memorial is celebrated on her beatification date rather than her death date of December 22nd. Desiring to do missionary work in China, she was instead sent west to New York in 1887 to help the thousands of poor Italian immigrants already there by establishing schools, orphanages, and hospitals. She founded the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, who provided education and healthcare services to the poor in NY and eventually across the U.S. The Order continues to minister in 15 countries on 6 continents. She left a lasting mark in Colorado, where "Cabrini Day" was established – the first state holiday honoring a woman. After being canonized in 1946, she was named as the "Universal Patroness of Immigrants" by Pope Pius XII in 1950.
