

What is the difference between temptation and sin?

The temptations of Jesus, as they are recorded in the Gospels (Mark 1:12, Luke 4:1, and Matthew 4:1), give us the proper direction with regard to sin and temptation. Jesus was tempted three times, but he did not sin. More than that, Jesus put his trust in God during the temptations. Jesus' message is clear: if you feel tempted, call out to God!

The Church teaches that sin is a deliberative process. Temptation is something that happens to you without your consent: a thought or desire pops into your mind. For temptation to become a sin, you have to entertain that thought or desire, or plan to act on it, or do it. That's when temptation "turns a corner" and becomes sin.

Although the sacrament of penance is available throughout the year, the Church places a special emphasis on it during Lent. There may be a communal penance service in your area. Perhaps you can commit now to participating in the service. If it's been a while since you've been to confession or you're not sure what to do or say, just tell the priest. He will show you.

A WORD FROM POPE FRANCIS

Saints and Feasts of the Week

St. Patrick - Feast Day is March 17th. He was a Roman/British Christian missionary and bishop in Ireland during the 5th c. Known as the "Apostle of Ireland," he's noted for bringing Christianity to that country and is their patron saint. Kidnapped as a youth by Irish raiders, he was taken as a slave to Ireland and while there as a shepherd, he turned to his faith for comfort. He eventually escaped back to Britain, but returned to minister to the people, who were worshipping idols and began converting them to the true faith. He's credited with using the shamrock to demonstrate the Holy Trinity. His feast day is celebrated each year throughout the world.





St. Joseph - Feast Day is March 19th. He was a 1st c. Jew born in Bethlehem, who was the husband of Mother Mary and foster father of Jesus. He's venerated as the Patron of the Universal Church and his life has been recorded in the Gospels. Referred to as a "just man" in Scripture, he was a carpenter from the royal house of David, who was entrusted with the care of Mary and Jesus. It is believed that he died in Nazareth before Jesus started his public ministry and has been invoked by many for the grace of a happy death. He's also venerated as the patron

saint of fathers, workers, expectant mothers, and unborn children.

St. Turibius of Mogrovejo - Feast Day is March 23rd. He was a 16th c. well-educated Spanish scholar, lawyer, and professor, who later became a priest and bishop. He was chosen to serve as the Archbishop of Lima, Peru during the Spanish conquest. By devoting himself for 26 years to helping the poor and oppressed people there, he showed them the love of a Christlike shepherd, especially by his preaching, baptizing, and catechizing for the salvation of



their souls. He is credited with being the first known saint of the New World along with St. Rose of Lima and even predicted the exact date and hour of his own death. He's the patron saint of Peru, Latin American bishops, and native people's rights.
