
MARRIAGE: Notify the parish 6 months prior to proposed date. Attending an Engaged Encounter Weekend is required prior to marriage ceremony.

Both the reading from Sirach and Luke's Gospel tell us that those who humble themselves will find favor with God. They also point to a connection between humility and service. Those who give alms – who give without expecting repayment – will receive their reward in heaven.

LIFE OUT OF FOCUS

I found myself angry the other day, as we all do, I suppose, whenever we put our foot in our mouth, or forget about an important engagement, or scramble whatever it was we had hoped would be picture-perfect. What I had scrambled was a homily. For some reason, the image came out wrong, or the example did not fit, or it just did not come together the way I had hoped. And I was angry with myself to the point that it caught me off guard. It was an unexpected glimpse of what I didn't want to admit: the fact that the way people might perceive me as a preacher had taken on more importance than preaching God's word. Life had gotten out of focus. A perspective had been lost.

It happens to us all in the course of our lifetimes, and more than once. Grades become more important than learning, or being right more important than the relationship, or the address of where we live more important than the people living together. It happens between parent and child when a parent places greater significance on the son's or daughter's profession than on that son's or daughter's happiness. Like in the parable of Jesus, where we sit at table takes on greater meaning than the people who gather or the meal that is shared. That is what pride does. It distorts what is real and shifts the focus of life to ourselves. The antidote? A prayerful awareness of who we are and who God is.

Is it sacrilegious to throw away a sacramental?

"Sacramentals do not confer the grace of the Holy Spirit in the way that the sacraments do, but by the Church's prayer, they prepare us to receive and dispose us to cooperate with it" (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1670). Therefore, sacramentals confer grace through the Church's power of prayer and, if blessed, should not be thrown away but burned and/or buried. If the object has not been blessed, it can be discarded; however, it could also be donated to a Catholic ministry (school, prison, hospital, etc.) that would benefit from its distribution. (If a religious object was included in an unsolicited appeal letter from a charitable organization, it is safe to assume that it was not blessed.) If the object is worn or broken, it should be substantially altered so that it loses its form as a sacramental and then returned to the earthly elements. For example, a worn scapular should be burned and the ashes buried; a damaged statue should be further broken into smaller fragments and buried.

A European tradition on the Vigil of the Nativity of Saint John the Baptist (June 23) is to burn old sacramentals in bonfires and bury the ashes. Burning and/or burial respects the sacred nature once held by these items and prevents their adaptation for trivial use. Reverence and discretion are proper for whatever method of disposal.

FEASTS AND SAINTS OF THE WEEK



St. Anna the Prophetess - Feast Day is Sept. 1st. This early Christian saint, an elderly prophetess of the tribe of Asher, encountered the baby Jesus at the Temple of Jerusalem for his dedication. She became a widow after 7 years of marriage and had dedicated her life to worshipping God in the Temple by spending days and nights there in prayer and fasting. She was present in the Temple, when the infant Jesus was brought in by his parents. Like Simeon, she gave thanks to God and proclaimed him as the promised Messiah to everyone in Jerusalem, who were awaiting the redemption of Israel. She's mentioned in the Gospel of Luke and was blessed to be among a handful of witnesses to understand the significance of Jesus' birth.



St. Rose of Viterbo - Feast Day is Sept. 4th. A 13th c. poor virgin saint, she led a life of prayer, penance, and solitude. When there was a revolt in Viterbo against the pope, she and her family were exiled when she had spoken up against the emperor and took the pope's side. Even as a child, she gave up everything for the love of God to devote her life to one of penance and prayer, especially for the conversion of sinners and the poor. At the age of 10, the Blessed Mother instructed her to become a Secular Franciscan and she soon began preaching about sin and the sufferings of Jesus in the streets. She was also known for her mystical gifts of prophecy and miraculous powers. Having been refused entry into the Poor Clares Order, her incorrupt body after her death at age 18, was ordered by the pope to be enshrined at that monastery. She's the patron saint

of florists and flower growers.



St. Teresa of Calcutta - Feast Day is Sept. 5th. Also known as Mother Teresa, this 20th c. saint named Anjeze Gonxhe Bojaxhiu at birth, was an Albanian-Indian nun, who was known for founding the Missionaries of Charity to serve the world's poor and sick. At age 18, she left home to pursue missionary work and joined the Sisters of Loreto in Ireland. Soon after, she was assigned to Calcutta, India, where she became a teacher at a girls' school and then the principal. During a retreat, God revealed his desire for her to be "his light" in establishing a new Order for service to the poorest of the poor, which she did in 1950 to share God's thirst for loving. She has been admired for her faith, extraordinary charity, compassion, courage, and above all, her

humble works of love. She has received numerous honors for her humanitarian work, especially the Nobel Peace Prize in 1979. She died at age 87 and was canonized by Pope Francis in 2016. She's the patron saint of her Order, World Youth Day, and the Archdiocese of Calcutta.
