2024 Lenten Regulations, Diocese of Honolulu

FASTING:

In the dioceses in the United States, Catholics aged 18-59 are bound to fast on both Ash Wednesday (February 14th) and Good Friday (March 29th).

To fast means to consume one full meal a day at most, although taking of other, smaller quantities of food at the other customary mealtimes is permitted. Food and drink between meals (excepting water and medicine) is not permitted on days of fasting.

ABSTINENCE FROM MEAT:

Catholics aged 14 and up are to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday all Fridays of Lent, and Good Friday.

To abstain means refraining from eating beef, veal, pork, or poultry or at least, although eggs and milk products are acceptable. The consumption of fish and shellfish is permitted, though the penitential character of the abstinence should be kept in mind.

EASTER DUTY:

All the faithful, after they have been initiated into the Most Holy Eucharist, are bound by the obligation of receiving Communion at least once a year. This precept is to be fulfilled during the Easter Season unless it is fulfilled, for a just cause, at some other time during the year. This period is extended to include all the weeks of Lent and the Easter Season up to Trinity Sunday. (May 26th) More Lenten Regulations will follow in the next bulletin.

In the Our Father, we pray, "thy kingdom come." Will God's kingdom come only at the end of the world?

God's kingdom will come in its fullness only at Jesus' Second Coming, but the kingdom came into the world with Jesus' first coming as a man. That means we are in God's kingdom right now, but not in its fullness.

In the Scriptures, we read that John sends his disciples to ask Jesus if he is the Messiah or if they need to wait for another. Jesus responds, "The blind regain their sight, the lame walk, lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, the poor have the good news proclaimed to them" (Luke 7:22). These are all signs of the kingdom of God.


In the meantime, we don't have to just wait for God's kingdom to come in its fullness. We can make God's kingdom more of a reality on earth by visiting the sick, caring for the poor, and being kind to others. Loving your spouse is a sign of the kingdom of God. God's kingdom is among us, not completely but partially, and we can make it more of a reality in the good that we do for each other.

Saints and Feasts of the Week

St. Paul Miki & Companions - Feast Day is Feb. 6th. He was a Japanese Catholic Jesuit, who was martyred along with 25 other clergy and laity and canonized together in 1862. Due to the persecution of Catholics for fear of the Jesuits' influence, they were all arrested,

jailed, and executed in 1597. His last sermon was preached from the cross, where he was stabbed by a lance. Beforehand, he forgave his executioners, as Jesus had done. He's the patron saint of Japan.

St. Josephine Bakhita - Feast Day is Feb. 8th. She was a Sudanese-Italian Canossian religious sister, who was a slave in Sudan before arriving in Italy where she lived for 45 years. She was canonized a saint in 2000 and was the first black woman to receive this honor in modern times. She endured the horrors of slavery bravely, including 144 physical scars, before escaping to freedom through the religious order she joined after her conversion to Catholicism. She's the patron saint of victims of modern slavery and human trafficking as well as of Sudan.





St. Scholastica - Feast Day is Feb. 10th. She was the twin sister of St. Benedict of Nursia, who founded the Benedictine Order. She founded a religious community five miles from her brother's monastery and developed a close relationship with him. They were deeply committed to God and visited with each other only once a year, when they

discussed spiritual matters. She's the patron saint of Benedictine nuns, educators, and convulsive children and has been invoked against storms and rain.
