FOCUS: Have courage to follow the Lord on the way when he answers prayers.

In today's Gospel, Jesus asks Bartimaeus, What do you want me to do for you? Bartimaeus wanted his sight, and the Lord granted it. Bartimaeus then followed him on the way. As we encounter the Lord in the Eucharist, let us ask him for the courage to not only ask him for what we need but to follow him on the way when he answers.

THE PATH TO FAITH

The story of blind Bartimaeus is an illustration of how we come to be people of faith. Like Bartimaeus, we may find ourselves helpless and on the side of life's road as we watch the world go by. And like him, we too then turn to God for help. Just as Jesus called Bartimaeus, we may sense that God is calling us to trust and surrender to his vision of life for us. Throwing aside the cloak that he would use to gather alms by the roadside, Bartimaeus comes to Jesus. That simple action displays his willingness to leave his old way of life behind in order to follow Jesus.

This is how we come to faith—we are given a glimpse of life from God's perspective and must trust enough to cooperate with whatever God may bring our way. Such pivotal moments in life may come with the death of a loved one, the end of a relationship, or the loss of a job, when we need to trust that there is more to life in what lies ahead. Or it may come in those times when we need to learn how to cope with a lifelong illness, a failed dream, or growing old. It's all about how we come to faith—by trusting that God will bring us to new life, even though we may be blind to the ways he will bring it about.

Reflect: Have you ever experienced a hard ending that turned into a good beginning?

Dear Padre, October 27, 2024

II am an eighty-year-old with painful knee replacements. Am I allowed to remain seated during Mass? Also, at what age am I free to watch a televised Mass at home instead of going to Mass?

Your health condition permits you to remain seated while others in the congregation kneel or stand. Of primary importance is your valued presence, and your full, active participation with fellow members of your Catholic faith community. At Mass, "the faithful form a holy people…so that they may give thanks to God and offer the unblemished sacrificial Victim not only by means of the Priest but also together with him…" (General Instruction of the Roman Missal, 95).

However, if someone is incapable of attending Mass, then the obligation is abrogated, regardless of age. The Church allows a televised Mass primarily for people who are homebound, in hospitals, nursing homes, and prisons. "The televised Mass is never a substitute for the Church's pastoral care for the sick in the form of visits by parish ministers who share the Scriptures and bring Communion, nor is it ever a substitute for the Sunday Mass celebrated within a parish faith community each week" (Guidelines for Televising the Liturgy, USCCB, 2014). If you are unable to be present at Mass, you have an opportunity to identify with a worshiping community, hear the word of God, be moved to expressions of praise and thanksgiving, and unite with Christ in spiritual communion.

FEASTS & SAINTS OF THE WEEK



Sts. Simon and Jude – Feast Day is October 28th. These two 1st c. saints, who share the same feast day, preached the gospel (St. Simon in Egypt and St. Jude in Mesopotamia) and then traveled together to Persia, where they were both martyred in AD 65. Both were Apostles of Jesus and were faithful and zealous in their missions. St. Simon the Zealot, who is the patron saint of saw workers and tanners, was sawed in half. St. Jude Thaddeus, who is the patron saint of hope, desperate causes, and lost causes, died from being beaten with a club. Through

the power of the Holy Spirit, St. Jude made a profound difference in people's lives and is often depicted with a flame above his head, when the Holy Spirit descended upon him and others at



Feast of All Saints – Feast Day is November 1st. Also known as "All Saints' Day" and "All Hallows Day," this day commemorates all the saints of the Church, both known and unknown, who are in heaven. This day started in the 4th c. as a feast commemorating Christian martyrs and was held in various places and various dates near Easter and Pentecost. In the 9th c. some churches in The British Isles began commemorating saints on November 1st and then Pope Gregory IV extended this to the whole Catholic Church. In Western Christianity, many

Protestant churches also celebrate it along with Catholic churches on this same day. This feast serves as a reminder that God should be at the heart of all we do and that He continues to be at work in the world.



Feast of All Souls - Feast Day is November 2nd. Also known as "All Souls' Day" and "The Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed," this feast commemorates all those who've passed within the faith. It's a day of remembrance and prayer for those departed souls, especially our loved ones, who are believed to be in purgatory. With the faithful on earth praying for them, those souls can be cleansed, so that they may be reconciled to God in heaven. As part of the culture in the Philippines, Filipinos pay respect to those who have passed by visiting cemeteries.

This feast has been observed on this date since the 11th c., when it was established by Benedictine Abbot Odilo for his monastery to pray for souls in purgatory and then it quickly spread throughout the Christian world.
